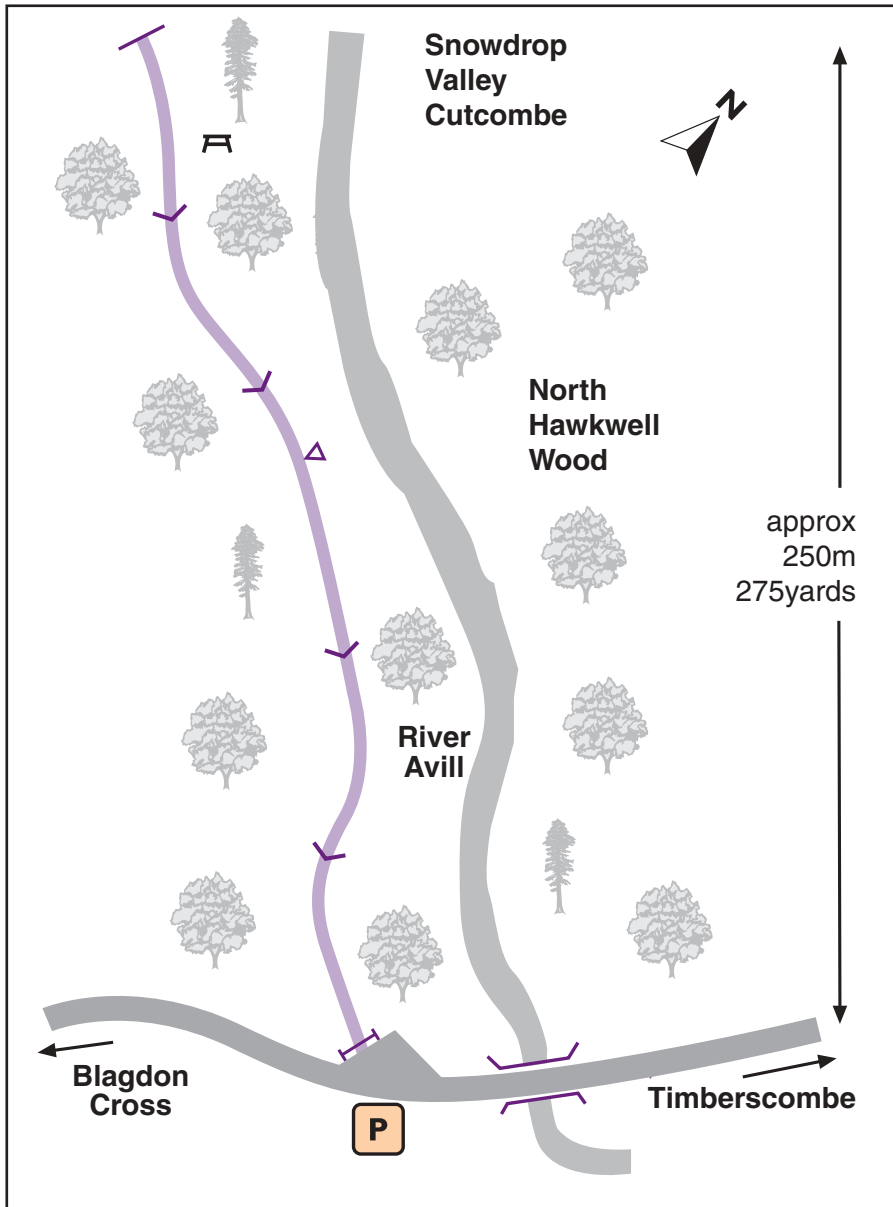

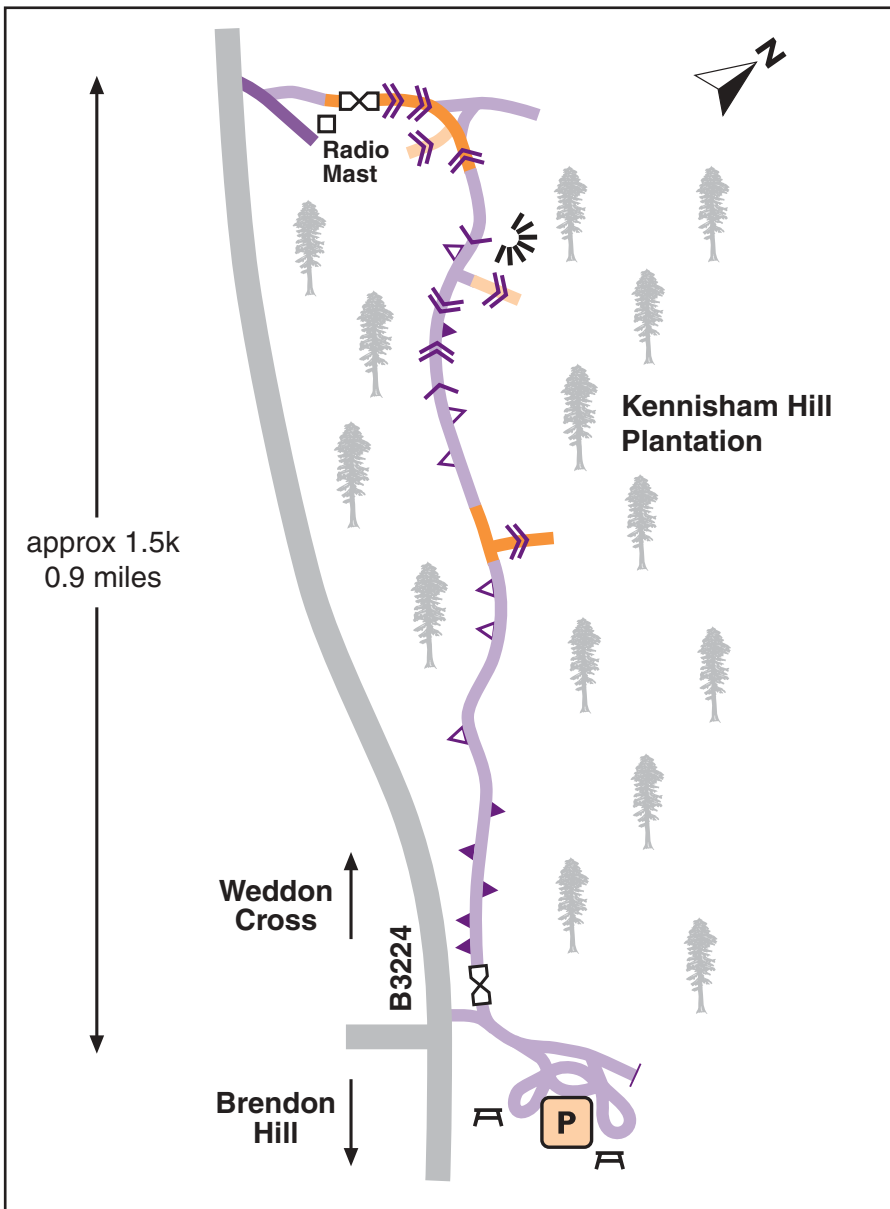
Drapers Way (W1)

This is a reasonably level walk through the woods, and accessible with a wheelchair. Lovely at any time of year, in February the snowdrops are prolific.



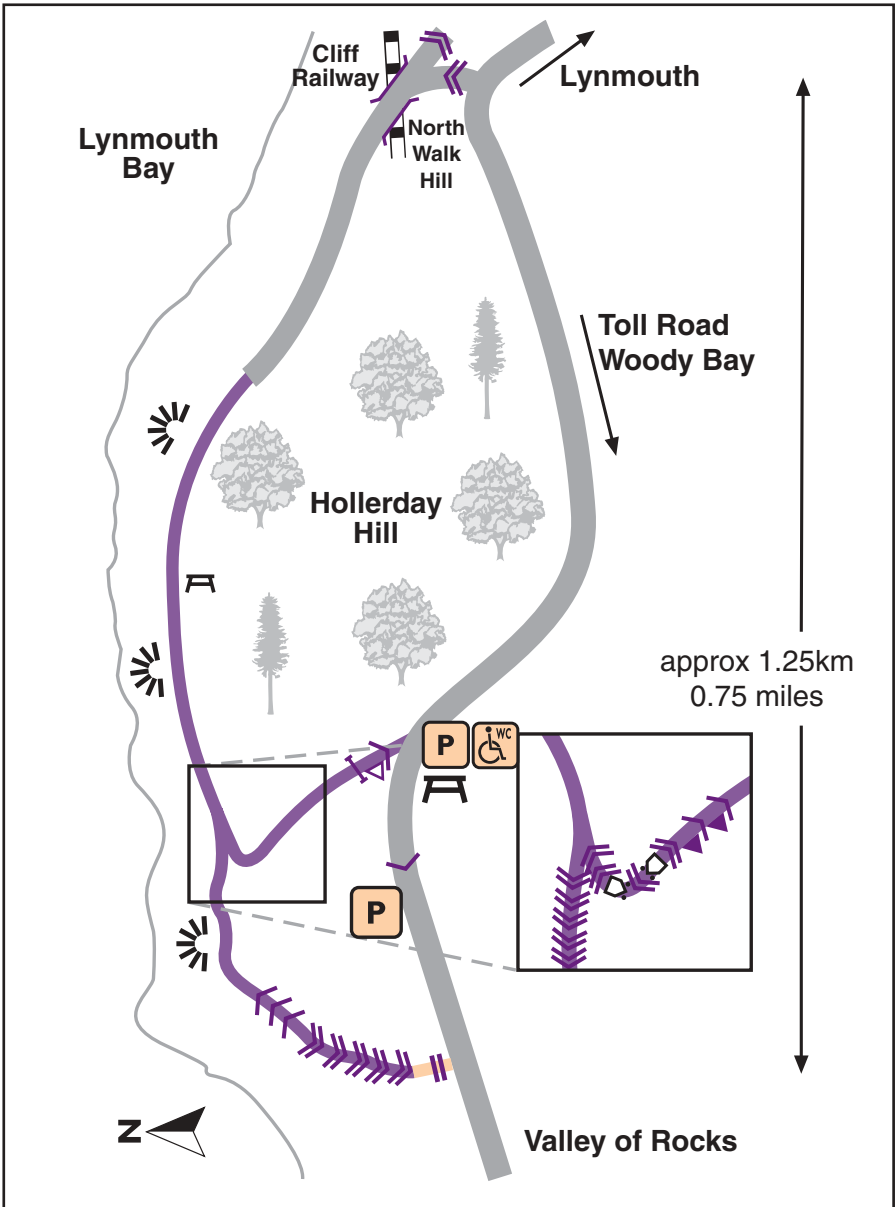
Kennisham Hill (W2)

A flat, reasonably level walk through conifer plantation.



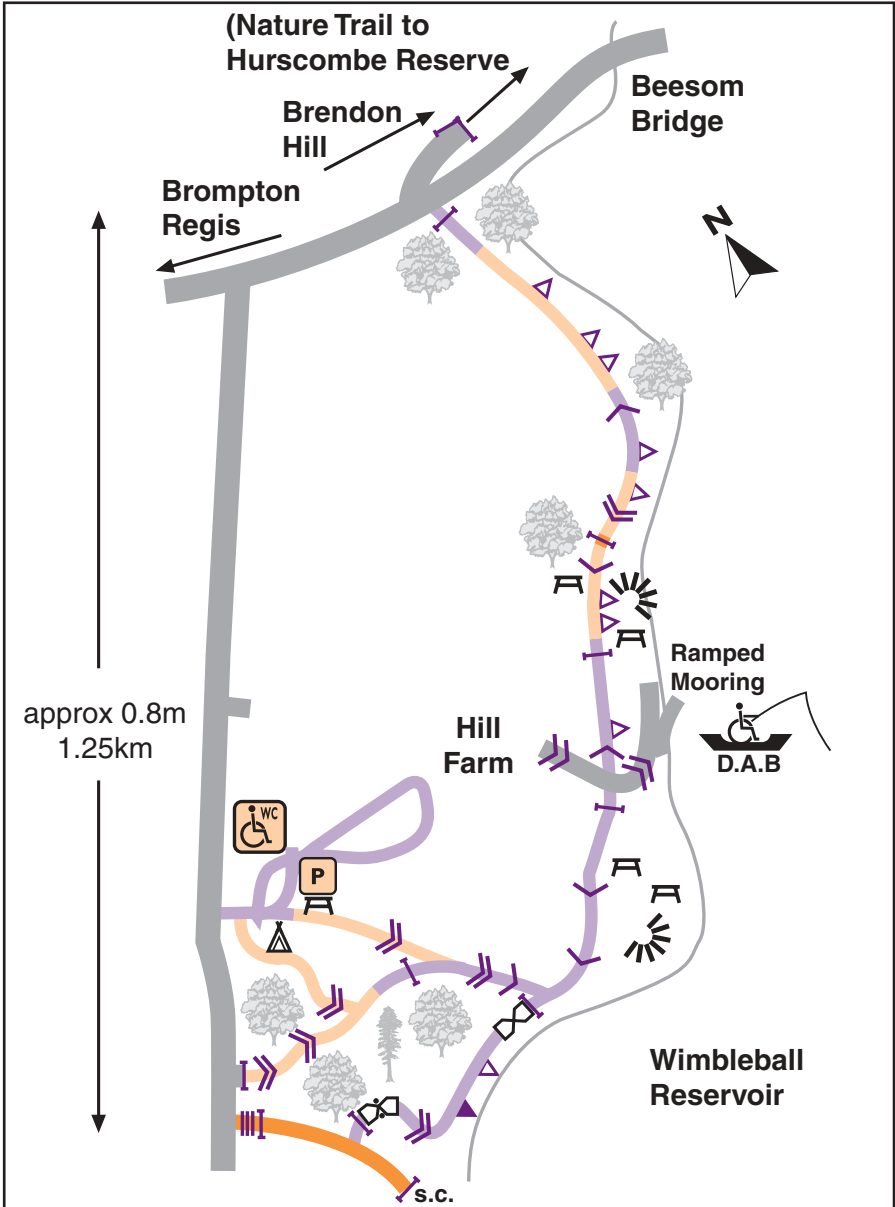
Valley of the Rocks (W3)

An exciting walk with spectacular views. Wheelchair users may find this one difficult as the path is steep and narrow in places.



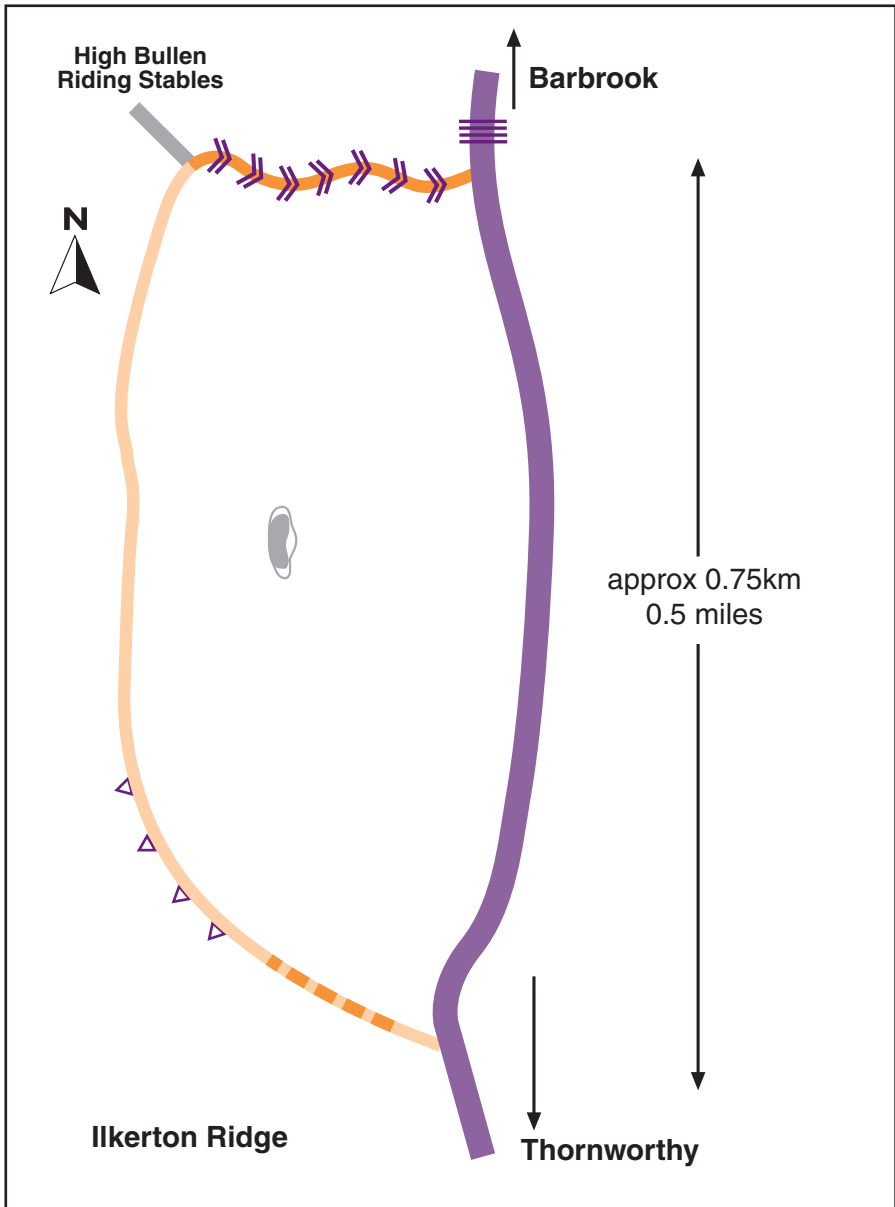
Wimbleball Reservoir (W4)

A pleasant walk along the waters edge. Not very good parking at the start and the walk has a number of gates along it and grassy sections.



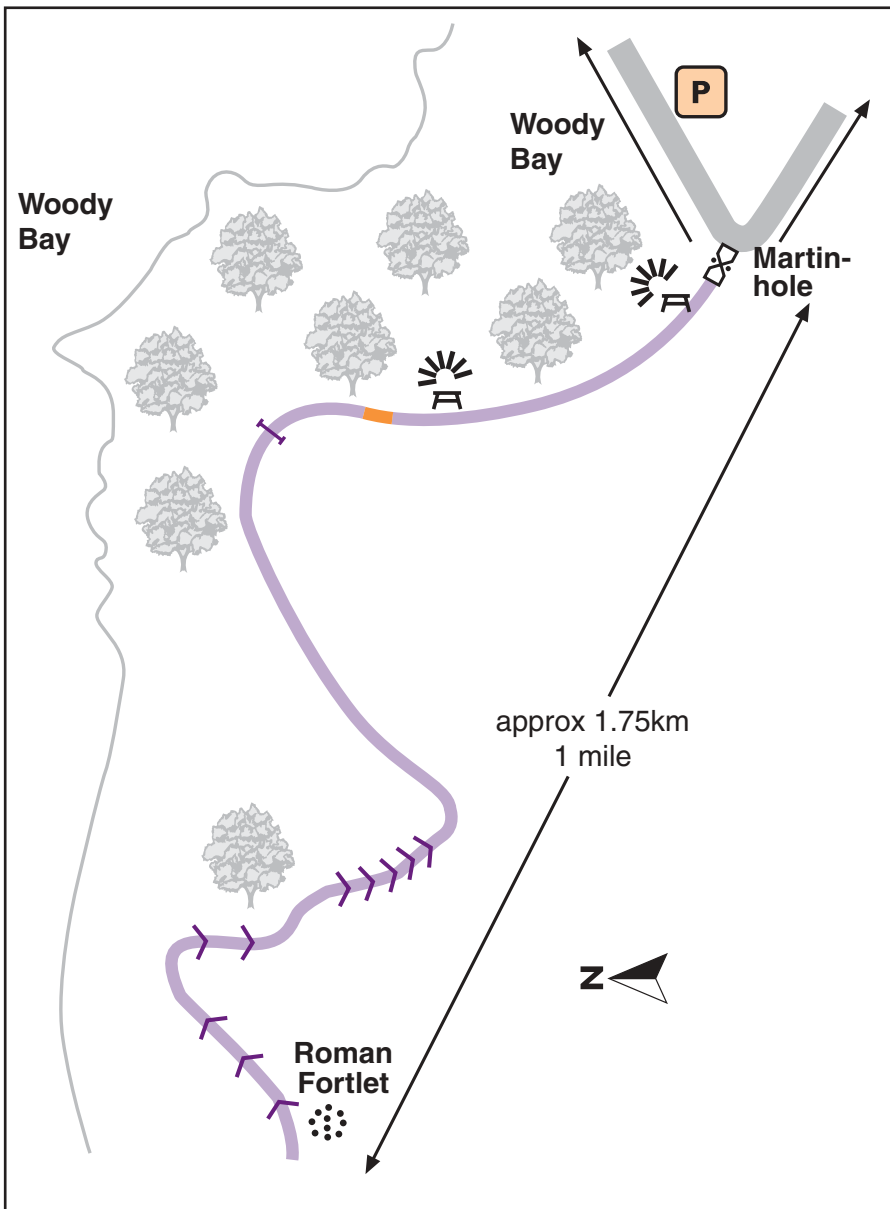
Ilkerton ridge (W5)

This walk follows a grassy path across the ridge, with fine views but wheelchair users should avoid in wet conditions.



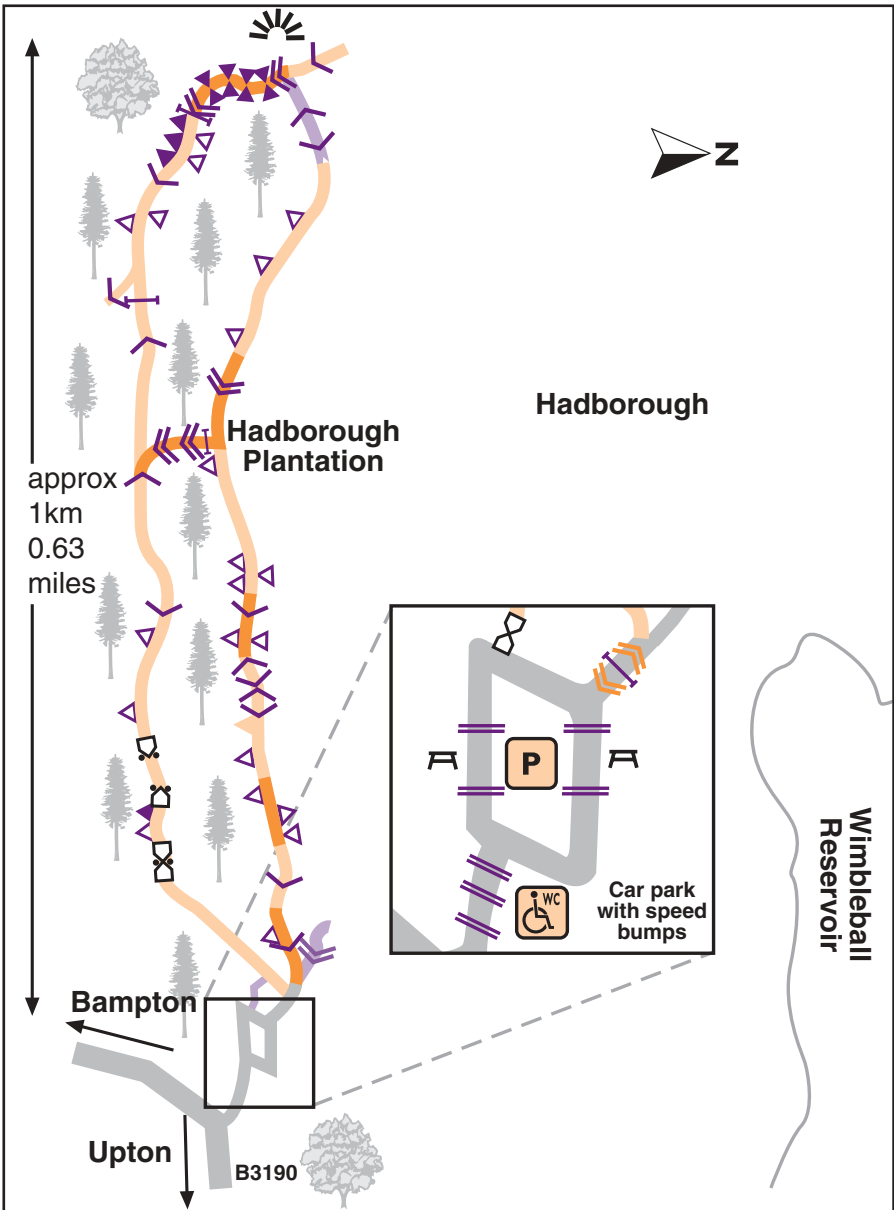
Woody Bay (W6)

This walk follows an unsurfaced footpath through the woods. A lovely walk but wheelchair users would probably need assistance.



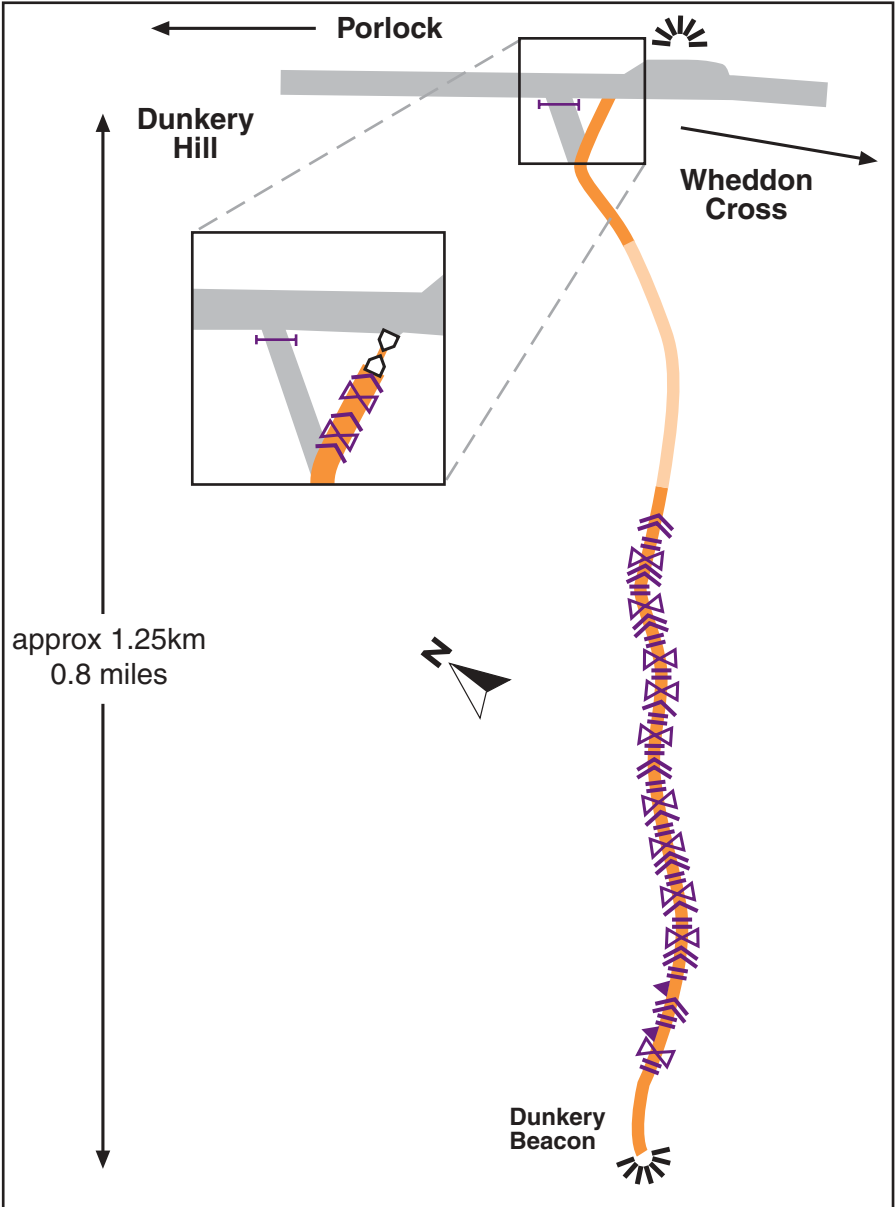
Haddon Hill (W7)

The walk follows the edge of the plantation on the edge of the moorland, which is grazed by a herd of Exmoor ponies.



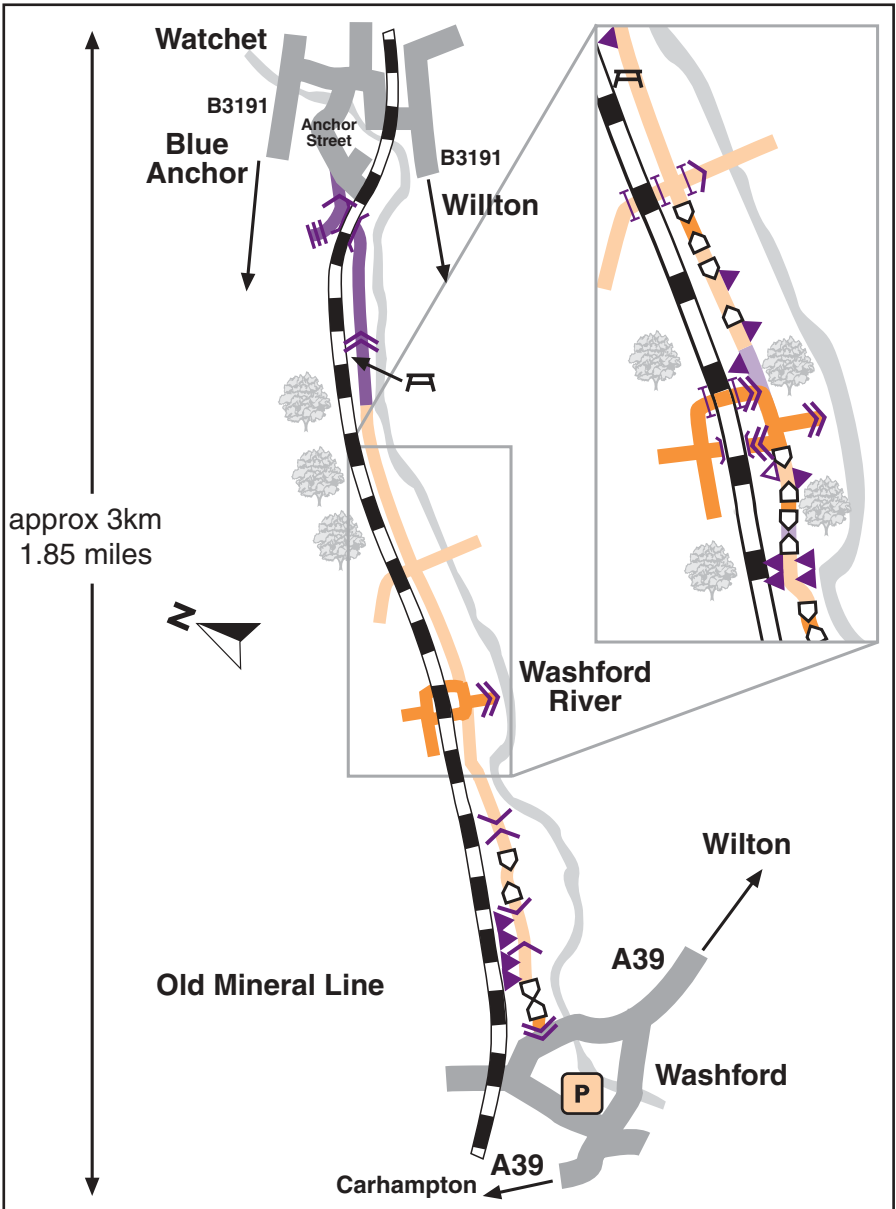
Dunkery Beacon (W8)

This is an exposed walk to the top of Dunkery Beacon (the highest point on Exmoor). An adventurous walk, but if you can make the climb, the views are well worth the effort.



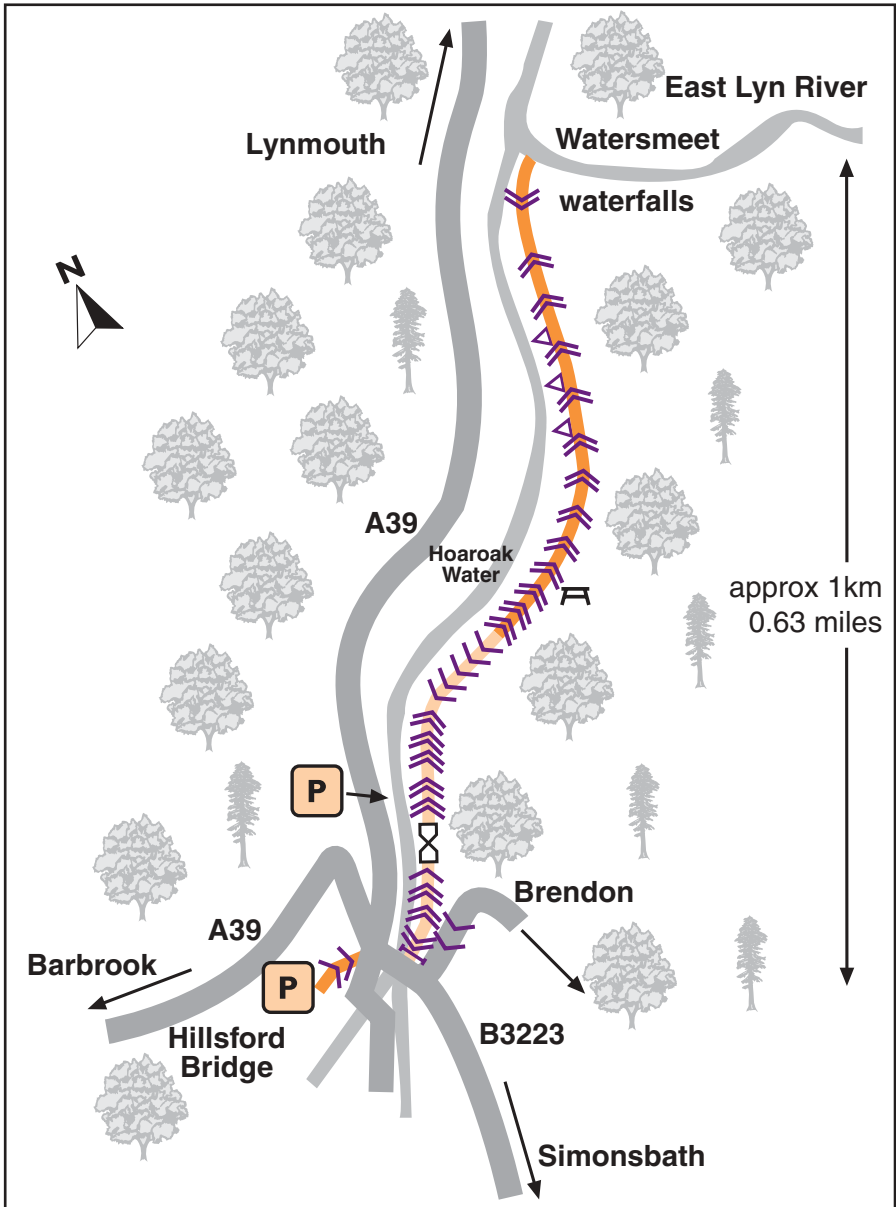
Old Mineral Line (W9)

A reasonable level, pleasant path between the West Somerset Railway line and the Washford river. Parking is a fair way from the entrance.



Watersmeet (W10)

A beautiful wooded valley of which the first 150m is undulating then becoming steep.



Tiverton Canal (W11)

A fine route along the tow path of the Tiverton canal. The route will be shared by cyclists on the Sustrans millennium cycle route.
